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Religious Education

Sunday, 17 Sep 2017: Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A

Gospel Mt 18: 21- 35

Parable of the official who, receiving mercy, does not show it to others.

In Sunday's Gospel Peter's question to Jesus and suggested answer is a reflection of the view that there is a limit to the number of times we should forgive someone. Seven is a significant number in scripture and implies a 'perfect' amount. Even though by his use of seven, Peter is suggesting that he should forgive someone many, many times, Jesus quickly corrects Peter and says not seven, but seventy-seven times (or seventy times seven). Jesus plays on the use of the number seven and multiplies it to indicate that one should forgive as many times as is required – without keeping count; without keeping score.

The story of the unforgiving servant is a familiar one of forgiveness and mercy being shown but not passed on. God's forgiveness is without measure and without end. Jesus warns that unless we seek to imitate God's forgiveness and forgive others 'from our heart' (with compassion) then we are not going to recognise the forgiveness of God and will cut ourselves off from it.

The whole idea of forgiving from the heart is a powerful contradiction of a popular concept: 'I can forgive, but not forget.' Is it really possible to forgive but refuse to forget? Surely holding on to a memory of hurt is holding on to the hurt itself and does not display that any forgiveness has occurred at all. To forgive but not forget is to keep count. How many times should I forgive the one who has hurt me? As many times as it takes!

Q. What gets in the way of forgiving someone when they have hurt you?

Q. Have you ever truly forgiven someone and tried to forget about what happened? Is it difficult?

On Wednesday 20th September there will be a Reconciliation Parent Information Night in the Parish Hall at 7.15pm for a 7.30pm start. This meeting is for the parents of Year 2 children as well as any other students in the grades above preparing to make the sacrament of Reconciliation.

Home School Learning Link

Sure-fire tips to getting kids to help at home!

Here are some ideas to keep in mind as you develop your family into a team of helpers:

- Give children realistic jobs rather than tasks that simply keep them busy. Kids can sense it when parents give them jobs to keep them busy. Make sure the jobs you give make a real contribution to the family's well-being.
- Balance the personal chores with family jobs. Involve children in choosing their jobs. Rotate the unpleasant tasks frequently.
- Place the more arduous or difficult tasks on a roster. The children can refer to it when needed, which takes the load off you and removes the need to remind them.
- Use grandma's principle* to ensure their helping jobs are done. That is, make sure jobs are completed before mealtimes and pleasant activities such as watching television.
- Avoid doing jobs for children. When children get the message that no one will do their jobs for them they will be more likely to help out.
- Show your appreciation for their help. Let them know that their contribution to the family is valued. If you do it often enough they may even show their appreciation for your help in return!
- Make sure they do the whole job, not half a job. Don't accept half-hearted efforts or half-completed jobs. If you think your child is capable of putting the cat food back in the fridge and placing the spoon in the dishwasher then insist that he or she does the whole job. That is what is valued in the world of work, which they will eventually enter.
- Rebrand the term 'chore' as 'help'. The term 'chore' definitely has an image problem. Mention the word and children turn up their nose in horror. Use the term 'help' as it is easier on the ear and really does indicate what you want from your children.

***Grandma's principle – putting activities in the right order. You get the bad things (making your bed) out of the way before you do the good things (watching TV or playing games).**

Keep in mind:

Separate helping at home from pocket money. Expect them to help without being paid. Children can do a mixture of self-help activities and family jobs. Use rosters to help children in developing a sense of responsibility.
