Fostering a culture of appreciation

towards others is an important value. Too often children (and yes even adults) can take for granted what others do for them. It is wonderful to see children who take the time to acknowledge and thank their parents, relatives, friends, teachers, peers etc. either verbally or in writing. In a world where we sometimes take people and the things they do for granted or expect so much from others it is amazing just how much a 'thank you' can do.



# **Religious Education**

Sunday, 24 Mar 2019: Third Sunday of Lent - Year C Gospel

Lk 13:1-9

#### Unless you repent you will all perish as they did.

When Jesus is asked about the deaths of some Galileans and some residents of Jerusalem, he seizes the opportunity to remind his audience that their obsession with the 'sin' of the victims is misplaced. He challenges all who are listening that unless they repent, they will all perish in a similar fashion. This would have been very confronting to those in the audience who were ingrained in the thinking that 'bad things only happen to bad people'. The purity codes of the day stated that if one maintained purity of action - obeying the Law and respecting the prohibitions on certain actions - then one was fulfilling one's duty and maintaining right relationship with God. Jesus chastises the people for this attitude and tells them that they all must 'repent'. For 1st Century Jews, the word 'repent' had a greater depth of meaning than our current understanding. Rather than simply 'being sorry', to repent meant to completely turn life around - both individually and as a society. His injunction to repent would be seen as a challenge to question motives and actions and set a new direction.

To follow this up, Jesus tells his audience a parable about a fig tree that has not borne fruit after three years. There are many interpretations of this parable and it is often interpreted in isolation from the gospel passage that immediately precedes it. Given the challenge to 'repent' that is given so strongly, we can see the parable as an example to the listeners that their time for repenting is running out. The one year reprieve for the fig tree is an indication to the listeners that their change of heart and change of spirit had better take shape in the very near future.

Q. How have 'good' people you know coped with bad things happening in their lives? Q. Where in your life is there a need for 'repentance' – a change of heart to one of compassion?

## Prayer for forgiveness...

Forgive those things we have done which have caused you sadness, and those things we should have done that would have brought you joy. In both we have failed ourselves, and you. Bring us back to that place where our journey began, when we said that we would follow the way that you first trod. Lead us to the Cross and meet us there. Amen.

## NAPLAN PRACTICE TEST

All schools participating in the NAPLAN Online in 2019 are expected to take part in a practice test between 25th March and 4th April. This requires participation of the entire cohort of NAPLAN, year 3 and 5 students from the school, and will involve a 45 minute Omnibus Test that includes Reading, Conventions of language and Numeracy test items. Writing will not be included in the Omnibus Test. The practice will provide students with an opportunity to become familiar with the types of questions they will experience in NAPLAN Online.

# Easter Eggs at School



A big city in the north of Italy. Angela lived and worked here. It was here that her thoughts and ideas were put into writing and she began the order of the Ursuline Sisters in 1535.

The children stay in the same sports house whilst at St Angela's. Siblings are in the same house. In this way we hope the children will develop a loyalty to their special house.

Next week the children will be bringing home their work books for the Key Learning Area of English. In English, over the course of the term, the children have been engaging in learning experiences to develop their knowledge and skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing. Remember to praise and encourage your child for their efforts so they will continue to learn with enthusiasm. Children really do treasure your comments and it allows us to see that the book did indeed leave the school bag and that you have had the opportunity to 'walk' through it with your child. Additionally, we ask that the books be returned promptly the next school day so that your child can continue their written work in the appropriate book.

We ask that throughout the day, parents do not crowd around the finish line, or in front of the recording table as it makes it difficult for those recording.

SAFETY:	It is important that children eat a good breakfast on the morning of the carnival. All children especially
	those running 2km and 3km, should hydrate before running.

UNIFORM: Children are to wear their school sports shorts, school hat, school sports top or school colour house polo tops. NO other coloured tops are permitted.

The 2km (3 laps) and the 3km (4 laps) involves the children running along the inside perimeter of the school grounds with marshals being in view the entire course. For the safety of all our children and to help our carnival run smoothly we require parent helpers to assist on the day. If you would like to assist and have completed the child protection requirements, please complete the slip below and return to school by <u>Friday 29th March</u>.
