Dear Parents,

I am so proud of the wonderful effort that all the children are putting into being "back together again". Each and everyday they are coming to school with a positive attitude, keen to learn and to be with their teachers and friends. Some of them have been reflecting that it has taken a bit of getting used to having set times for eating and playing, and to be waiting for their turn to do something. Others have shared that they are learning to get out of bed early enough in the morning to get dressed, have breakfast and then come to school on time and then at the end of the day they are feeling really tired.

The government has again relaxed some of the restrictions related to schools. This is wonderful for our Kindergarten 2022 students who will now be able to attend an orientation session at the school. Our Year 6 students will also be able to enjoy the usual rights of passage afforded to the Year 6 graduating students of St Angela's - Year 6 Assembly, Graduation Evening, Motiv8 Day and Parent organised Dinner Disco. We will also be able to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation for Year 3 and a Whole School Thanksgiving Mass (students only) at the end of the year.

Thank you to the many parents who offer to volunteer in support roles at St Angela's throughout the year in particular canteen helpers, parent helpers in classrooms and library helpers. These roles will recommence in 2022 when classroom reading helpers and excursion volunteers will be called for. The canteen will reopen in 2022 when it is anticipated that we will no longer need to have staggered lunchtimes. As the term progresses I will keep you informed about any other changes that we are able to manage at school at the same time as making the health and safety of our students and staff the priority. Semester 2 Reports.



Gospel *Mk* 12:41-44

This poor widow has put more in than all who contributed.

The Poor Widow's Offering

Have you ever watched how people give their offerings in church? The money may be placed, dropped, plopped, or tossed in the collection plate. How did it happen in Jesus' time? Jesus was sitting with His disciples in the Temple, watching people bringing their offerings. In those days people took their offerings to the Temple court and dropped them into collection boxes. Many rich people lived in Jerusalem. They lived in nice houses. They wore fancy clothes. They had plenty to eat. And after they had paid for their nice houses and fancy clothes and good food, they would take some of the money they had left to the Temple for an offering. Dressed in their finest clothes, they would go to the Temple when they knew a lot of people would be there. After looking around to make sure people were watching, they would pour their money into the collection boxes. Clatter, tinkle, jingle, jangle. They liked it when their money made a lot of noise. They liked it when people turned to see who had put so much money into the collection box. They hoped people were whispering, "See how much offering that person brought? He certainly is generous." Jesus knew that those rich people brought only what was left over after they had purchased all the things they wanted. Then Jesus noticed a woman at the collection box. Jesus knew that her husband had died and that she was a widow. Many times she might have gone without food. The woman looked around to see if anyone was watching. She was embarrassed because she could bring only a tiny little offering. When she thought no one would see her, she slipped two tiny coins into the collection box and hurried away. But Jesus had seen her. He had seen the two tiny coins she slipped into the offering box. Jesus said to His disciples, "This poor widow has put in more than all the others." As she heard Jesus' words, "tears of joy filled her eyes." She may have had no money to buy bread for dinner but she was happy to give an offering to God. Even though her offering was tiny, she gave more than all the others because she gave it cheerfully and out of love for God.

Mission Markets

This term, Year 5 are learning to identify and create practical ways in which they can share Jesus' mission to the poor and oppressed. Their inquiry learning project this term asks them to answer the following driving question: When can I use my gifts and talents to enable others to flourish?" In response to this, the students will be investigating the Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) in order to create an initiative that will support the work that they do.

The students will prepare a presentation for each class that explains the work of the JRS and how each person at school can help this organisation. Each class will have an activity that you and your family are encouraged to participate in and you will be invited to send in your donation and a photo of what you did. All proceeds raised will go directly to the JRS to support their work with refugees.

Parents are encouraged to ask their children what they learned from Year 5 about the JRS and why we are helping them.

The JRS is in desperate need of money donations and gift cards as a priority. Food donations can include:

- basmati rice
- long life milk
- cooking oil
- snacks for school lunches (biscuits and muesli bars)
- toiletries (e.g. toothbrushes, soap, deodorant) nappies (sizes 3, 4, 5 and 6)

They do not require tinned items this year.

Year 5 will have a collection box outside the front gate during Week 6 and would appreciate donations of these items. Money donations and gift cards can be placed in an envelope and given to class teachers to send to the office.

Competitor Swimming Carnival (Student Only)

We have received information from CEDP that schools can proceed with organising a Swimming Carnival for competitors in preparation for the Zone Swimming Carnival in February 2022. This carnival needs to comply with COVID guidelines established by the NSW Department of Education and CEDP and can only be conducted with staff and fully vaccinated essential helpers in attendance. Competitors will need to be transported by their parents to and from Blacktown Aquatic Centre. Spectators will not be able to attend the carnival.

The Competitors Swimming Carnival (Student Only) has been scheduled for Monday 29th November 2021 to enable students who wish to trial to compete at the Hills District Zone Swimming Carnival in February 2022.

This is for students in Years 2-5. Students who turn 8 in 2022 from Year 1 who are able to competently swim 50m Freestyle and do so within the time criteria of 1 minute 20 seconds, can compete in the carnival.
