PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Family love: a vocation and a path to holiness

In this year and month of the 10th World Meeting of Families, Pope Francis reminds us that:

Families are centres of learning – Parents are the prime educators of their children and best placed to pass on core values such as a sense of self-worth and of caring for others.

Families have a mission – In the religious practices of the home a child first senses a reverence for God. This flows on to include living justly and exercising a social conscience.

Families shape society – They offer a humanising and personalising influence. In a family, one's importance is not determined by salary, status or age. A family says to each member:

All members of a family play a vital role in family life:

- Aunts and uncles, single or married, are often crucial mentors, providing wisdom, stability and empathy to their nephews and nieces.
- Grandparents bring gifts of time, memory and perspective. They help network extended family, fostering reconciliation and family traditions.
- Children inspire hope and optimism. They call forth generosity and self-sacrifice in their carers helping them to grow in holiness and virtue.

As parents, we worry about our children and the rapidly changing world in which they are growing up. Passing on the faith in such an environment can feel overwhelming. Remember: faith is 'caught' more than taught! If we work on our own faith development we can be confident that our Christian love will not be lost on our children.



We love you for who you are; you belong to us.

Simple practices like a family prayer space and bedtime blessings form the foundation of faith for families and communicate the constancy of God's love.

Diversity is the norm

In NSW Catholic schools, more than 18 percent of the student population require adjustments to their learning to accommodate their inclusion in school.

For many years, Catholic Education Department of Parramatta has advocated the statement 'diversity is the norm'. Diversity comes in many forms; students with learning difficulties, speech and language delays, dyslexia, anxiety, autism spectrum disorder, anaphylaxis, asthma, diabetes, epilepsy, sensory loss....the list goes on. Being inclusive means we willingly cater for all students, providing adjustments to ensure they are safe, happy, healthy and successful learners.

Beyond meeting our moral obligation to provide an inclusive, safe environment for all students, we also have a legal obligation under the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and the Disability Standards for Education (2005) to ensure that students with disability can fully access and participate in education on the same basis as other students. The Disability Standards also require that all education providers in every sector, develop and implement strategies to prevent harassment and victimisation of people with disability. Harassment in this case means any action that is likely to humiliate, offend, intimidate or distress a person with a disability. Harassment and victimisation of students with a disability is unlawful and education providers are required to take all reasonable steps to prevent this from happening. Every student in our community has the right to fully participate in all aspects of school life, both academically and socially and no student will be denied the opportunity to interact with their peers in a safe, respectful manner.

Thank you for your continued partnership with St Angelas Staff. Together we can achieve so much.

COVID

Families at St Angela's continue to experience COVID cases, so it is important for you to monitor your children for symptoms and keep them at home if they are unwell. COVID SAFE PROTOCOLS

All students, families and staff are requested to follow NSW Health's advice to reduce the risk of not only transmitting COVID-19, but also other illnesses that may affect schools this winter such as the flu. Therefore we ask that students, staff and family members who visit the school

Parents are required to:

- inform the school if their child tests COVID positive and keep the child at home in isolation for the required 7 days.
- inform the school if their child is a close household contact, administer a RAT daily before the child attends school and keep the child home if they are unwell or symptomatic

STOP WORK ACTION THURSDAY SOTH JUNE, 2022

Parents would be aware from the media that Thursday 30th June, 2022 has been identified as a stop work action day by the Independent Education Union (IEU). A number of our staff may take part in protected industrial action (stop work action) on this day to progress their claims for a new enterprise agreement. It is not known at this time how many staff members will participate. I want to assure you that supervision will be provided at school on this day, however no classes will be held. Given this, we strongly encourage families not to send their children to school on Thursday 30th June 2022 given the potential for limited staff to be at school. At the same time, we appreciate families' concerns about further potential disruption to students and the school community. We have confirmation from CEDP that absences on this day are not recorded or counted as absences for statistical purposes.
